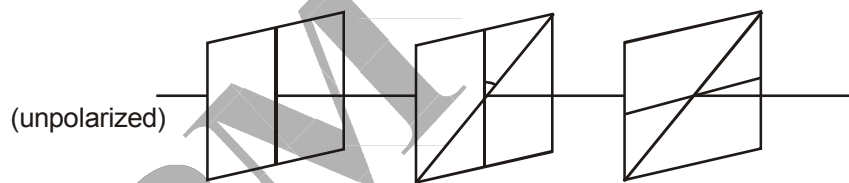

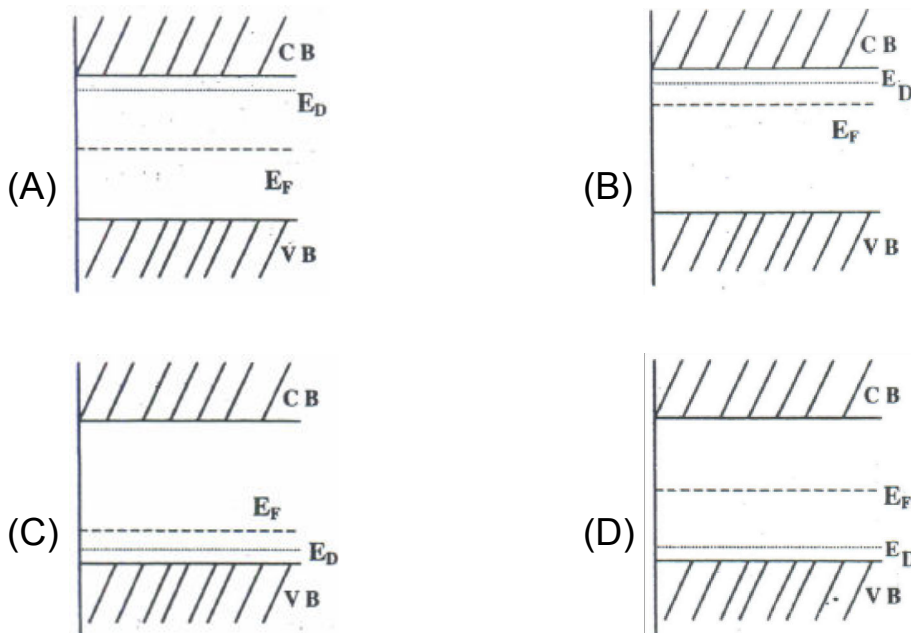

HINTS & SOLUTION

- 1.(C) Two macroscopic system, which are in thermal contact, the required condition for the equilibrium is that their b parameter must be equal.

$$b = \frac{\partial}{\partial E} \log_e G, \quad G \text{ @ accessible phase space volume}$$

$$\text{So } \frac{1}{\beta} = kT$$

$$\frac{1}{T} = k \frac{\partial}{\partial E} \ln G$$

$$\partial S = \frac{\partial Q}{T}$$

$$\frac{\partial S}{\partial Q} = \frac{1}{T}$$

$$\frac{\partial S}{\partial Q} = k \frac{\partial}{\partial E} (k \ln G)$$

on comparing

$$S = k \ln \Gamma(E, V, N)$$

and it is obvious that at equilibrium the accessible phase volume is maximum.

- 2.(B) The first law of thermodynamics can be given

$$dQ = dU + dW$$

here dQ and dW both are path function and dU is state function. For making

dW a perfect differential, we take $dQ = 0$

$$\text{So } dU + dW = 0$$

$$dW = -dU$$

and $dQ = 0$ occur in adiabatic process, so, dW_0 is a perfect differential if the process is adiabatic.
